New Signs Ask Motorists to Rate Our Work Zones

Strategically placed signs give advance notice to motorists that they will soon approach an active work zone. In fact, every aspect of a highway work zone, from the signs to the distance between the channelizers, is carefully orchestrated to make it as safe as possible for employees and motorists.

Starting this spring, new signs will appear in advance of work zones. Against a bright blue background, these signs simply say “Rate Our Work Zone – modot.org.”

“We are placing these signs near the beginning of work zones as a way to encourage motorists to tell us what they think,” said Julie Stotlemeyer, traffic liaison engineer. “Once motorists safely reach their destinations, we want their feedback on what it was like to travel through the work zone.”

MoDOT is looking for the public’s opinion on a variety of work zone details – including clear and understandable signing, channelizers and barrels providing proper guidance, and whether or not the work zone caused motorists any delays.

“We are working to have these signs displayed not just for construction projects, but on maintenance activities as well,” said Stotlemeyer. “You might not see the sign at every work zone, but we want to use them where they will serve as a reminder to motorists that our survey is out there if they have time to fill it out.”

The purpose of the signs, and the work zone surveys, is to maintain an exemplary level of customer service. The department uses those survey results to evaluate work zones, look for ways to improve them and meet customer expectations.

“Ultimately, we want to make work zones safe and keep motorists moving through them with the smallest delay possible,” said Stotlemeyer.

All motorists traveling through a work zone, including MoDOT employees, are encouraged to participate in the on-line survey at www.modot.mo.gov/workzones/Comments.htm.

Performing Tasks Near Traffic Give Workers a Bad Feeling – or Worse

Kathi Brundage knows that feeling. So does Brandon Cracraft. And Eric Thompson.

They know fist hand that sudden close encounter with death while just trying to do their jobs in a highway work zone.

Three survivors in the Kansas City District talk about work zone awareness from the worker's standpoint as MoDOT and partners throughout the country observe Work Zone Awareness Week April 23-27.

For Kathi, it was painful and startling. While she was inspecting a paving operation on Route 24 in Independence alongside active traffic, a vehicle came too close and clipped her with its side mirror. "I was standing on the channelizer when a car hit me," she said. "At first, it didn't register with me what had happened. I ended up with a big bruise on the back of my right arm." Kathi said working in a construction zone near traffic can be nerve-racking at times, "and when they don't even slow down, you think, 'Seriously? You didn't even see me?'"

Brandon also had no warning. A contractor's truck backed over him, then kept backing.

Brandon was the senior construction inspector for a deck repair on Manchester Bridge at I-70. "I was walking away from the contractor's truck, and the contractor was backing up. He backed over me with the truck," Cracraft

said. The driver told MoDOT he saw Brandon, then lost track of him as the driver continued to back up. "It crushed my shoulder blade and the middle knuckle of my right hand middle finger," Brandon said. "I was out of work five months, and did therapy during that time."

Always alert to safety issues, Brandon says "now I'm hyper vigilant."

Eric said a contractor saved him. He was a paving inspector on a job on I-70, and was walking with his back to traffic, but going in the same direction, when a worker on the job grabbed him and pulled him away from a truck that was carrying a flat precast concrete panel hanging off the side. "At the very least, it would have clipped me in the head and killed me, and if it had caught

me straight on, it would have decapitated me," Eric said. "I wouldn't have seen it coming." Like Kathi and Brandon, Eric is even more alert to what may happen in a construction zone.

No Substitute for Vigilance

The day was sunny and warm in Springfield. The work zone was properly set up in the left lane on one side of a four-lane expressway. Approaching drivers had plenty of sight distance.

Republic Maintenance Crew Leader Ron Plaster had just picked up tools to use in a pavement repair operation. He heard a noise behind him. Cones were being dragged underneath a car that was trying to beat a line of other vehicles to the merge point.

As he turned, he was struck by the car's side rear-view mirror and knocked down. Fortunately he was only bruised. But the incident of several years ago made him realize that being in the right place inside a work zone does not guarantee a worker's safety.

"It just goes to show you that even on the best days, things can go wrong," he said. "So be really careful. Watch what's happening around you."

For Your Safety

During the month of May a nationwide focus will be placed on three campaigns - safety belt usage, motorcycle awareness and teen alcohol use.

“Click It or Ticket” May 21 thru June 3 is a national campaign designed to increase seat belt use and reduce highway fatalities. The campaign couples high-visibility enforcement with education. Here are the facts:

- Seat belts are the most effective safety feature ever invented and have helped save thousands of lives.
- Sadly, one in five Americans fail to regularly wear a seat belt when driving or riding in a motor vehicle.
- Missouri’s seat belt use is 79 percent, compared to 85 percent nationwide.

- Car and SUV drivers are most likely to buckle up while truck and teen drivers are least likely to wear a seat belt.
- Seven out of 10 Missourians killed in a traffic crash are unbuckled.
- Seat belts reduce the risk of fatal injury by 45 percent.

Motor Cycle Awareness is also a national campaign to target awareness on sharing the road with motorcycles. This campaign reminds us that:

- Motorcycles are vehicles with the same rights and privileges as any motor vehicle on the roadway
- About 20 percent of all passenger vehicle crashes end up in injury or death, but almost 80 percent of all motorcycle crashes end up in injury or death.

- Ninety-nine percent of the people who died in crashes involving a motorcycle on Missouri roads were the motorcyclist.
- Missouri law requires all motorcycle riders to wear a DOT-approved helmet.
- A rider without a helmet is 40 percent more likely to die in a crash than one with a helmet.

Youth Alcohol Awareness

Drinking and driving are a lethal combination, even more so when young drivers are involved. This campaign targets underage drinking to decrease alcohol-related crashes. Did you know:

- Impaired driving contributes to nearly 30 percent of all Missouri traffic fatalities.



- Teens are at far greater risk of death in an alcohol-related crash than the overall population, despite the fact they cannot legally purchase or publicly possess alcohol in any State.
- In 2010, 217 people were killed and 897 seriously injured in crashes involving an impaired driver.
- Missouri has a Zero Tolerance Law. If you are under 21, your license will be suspended if you’re caught driving with even a trace of alcohol in your system.
- If you cause a fatal crash while intoxicated, you can be charged with involuntary manslaughter, a felony resulting in up to seven years of jail time, a \$5,000 fine or both.

Your Voice On Safety and Security

The Workplace Security Team, lead by Central Office Health and Safety Manager Jeff Lockwood, is taking another step in its efforts to improve security in the workplace – a 24/7 phone line to report security issues.

Your Voice is a fully automated phone line that allows employees to report non-emergency, non-life threatening workplace security issues, such as a co-worker showing aggressive behavior or a security issue at a facility.

“Our team felt strongly about having this capability for employees,” said Lockwood. “If anyone sees threatening behavior or problems in or around a facility relating to security, we want to know about it. This automated phone line will make it easy for employees to report those types of situations.”

Lockwood stressed it is important for employees to remember that this is not an emergency line. In any emergency situation employees should immediately dial 911, and then contact their local security coordinator.


The team still believes that reporting workplace security issues to a supervisor is the best way to bring a problem or potential problem to someone’s attention, but sometimes employees are not comfortable in doing that.

“This automated phone line gives employees the opportunity to report security issues and remain completely anonymous,” said Lockwood. “The fact that they can make a report 24/7 and do so anonymously if they choose, will help make sure we are being informed if there are security issues out there

that need to be addressed.”

When calling Your Voice, employees need to be prepared to give specific details of the incident or situation. The automated phone line will prompt for information.

To spread the word about this new security measure, posters will be sent to all facilities and departments to place on bulletin boards, business type cards with



the phone numbers will be given to all employees, and Health and Safety Managers will be discussing at every possible opportunity.

Workplace security is everyone’s responsibility. If you see something

that’s not right, use Your Voice and report it - 573-526-2921 or toll-free at 855-577-6357.

Organizational Changes Delay Employee Survey

MoDOT’s annual employee satisfaction survey will take its second year off in 2012, but will return in 2013. With the large number of organizational changes occurring in the past two years, department senior managers chose not to conduct the annual employee satisfaction survey. According to Chief Financial Officer Roberta Broeker, management is still concerned with employee satisfaction, but the assessment needs to be done on our final structure in 2013.

“We are still in the midst of getting the right people in the right jobs, and won’t complete that until June,” said Broeker. “We think it’s important that everyone know the outcome of job fills before we survey. Honestly, we also need to get through the very difficult last step of

layoffs before we turn our attention to this effort. We know, based on the number of negative comments we habitually receive about conducting employee satisfaction surveys, that some of our employees think its wasted effort. To address that, we want to involve a cross section of the workforce in developing the next survey, and that too will take a little extra time.”

In the meantime, Broeker encourages department managers and supervisors across the state to be open to employee concerns and look for opportunities to improve the workplace and employee satisfaction. The next annual employee satisfaction survey is scheduled for May 2013.

"We really want drivers to have as smooth a ride as possible on our roads, and hopefully we can patch a lot of these potholes all at once."

"We are always looking for ways to improve our roads," Liles says. "We're out there every day keeping our roads in as good of shape as possible, and this is a great time to focus on getting rid of as many potholes as possible."

I-70 Tolling Dominates Dialogue Session

With more than 160 area residents in attendance, Chief Engineer Dave Nichols and District Engineer Paula Gough, fielded several dozen questions about transportation during the most recent “Dialogue with MoDOT” session held in Warrenton. However, the majority of the questions surrounded the I-70 tolling topic that has arisen as a potential way to make improvements to the interstate.

“There were specific questions about where the tolls would be placed and concerns that those who use the interstate to commute would be the hardest hit; they felt like funding should be spread around the state,” Paula said.

The condition of the interstate, even though iterated by the chief engineer and depicted with an example in front of the audience, was not an issue for the audience. Amid the concerns about I-70 tolling, there were compliments to maintenance crews and MoDOT staff for the work they do to maintain the roads and bridges.

“The reason for our dialogue sessions is to be more accessible in our customers’ environment, which helps them be more comfortable asking questions,” Paula said. She doesn’t shy away from the tough questions, including those about funding or tolling. “We want to know what people think, and this is a great way to find out...in their community,” she added.

Project Changes Please Highway 79 Community

It’s never a pleasant subject to broach when MoDOT proposes closing a road to make repairs, and communities along Highway 79 have been hit hard in the last few years. This is why changes have been made to the contract to replace a bridge near Foley. Working with the community, MoDOT has shortened the contract time for the project and added a second detour that will be signed for local and tourist traffic.

“The economy has been tough on everyone, and we’ve had 79 closed off and on for several years due to landslides, so we wanted to mitigate the inconvenience as much as possible,” said District Engineer Paula Gough. Another bridge near Elsberry is slated to close for replacement next year.

“We are working with that community and area officials to make a similar proposal,” Paula explained.

A Ground Breaking Day

March 12 was a ground breaking day. The KC district celebrated the kick-off of two major projects with ground breaking ceremonies.

The start of the Route 13 North Leg project in Johnson County was made official at a ground breaking ceremony. About 50 people joined Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission Chairman Rudy Farber, state, county and local officials, representatives from the Route 13 Corridor Committee and the Pioneer Trails Rural Planning Committee to break ground for the project.

The project will extend the last five miles of the 11-mile-long Route 13 East Loop around Warrensburg. Emery Sapp & Sons is the general contractor for the \$10,126,672 project. Work will conclude in August 2013.

The final segment completes a long-planned realignment of the main highway route. By tying in the north leg several miles north of Route 50, through traffic will avoid stop-and-go

congestion in downtown Warrensburg. The new segment will be constructed between the portion completed in 2010 at Route HH north of Route 50 to a point of existing Route 13 just south of the intersection with Routes V and OO.

Another ceremony, this one in Clay County, broke ground on the \$24 million project to build two new interchanges on Route 169. More than 50 people stopped by to help kick-off the project with MoDOT, city, county and state officials.

The new interchanges at 96th and 108th Streets in Kansas City will improve traffic safety, provide better access, and accommodate economic development. Full access diamond interchanges will replace the signalized intersections at 95th Terrace and 108th Street.

Awarded to Ideker Construction Company, these safety improvements are a welcome sight for the thousands of motorists and MoDOT's partners in the Northland. Work has started and will conclude November 2013.

Bridge Beams Placed for U.S. 63 Interchange Project

A new interchange along U.S. 63 in Boone County is taking shape, as construction continues at Route H just south of Columbia.

MoDOT is building the new interchange to improve safety and traffic flow along U.S. 63.

Contractor crews began work in August 2011, clearing, grading and completing drainage work in the project area. In the last few months, crews have been working on the Route H bridge and the

new Turkey Creek bridge on the new southbound U.S. 63 lanes.

The diamond interchange and new southbound lanes will allow for safe access to and from the Columbia Regional Airport and provide additional economic development opportunities for the community.

The \$9.8 million project will include new southbound lanes from north of Route 163 to Route H. The new lanes are built in the median, allowing the

existing southbound lanes to become an outer roadway.

Additional innovative safety improvements are part of the project, including j-turns, acceleration, and deceleration lanes at intersection along the highway.

These improvements will allow vehicles to safely merge in and out of traffic, reducing the chance for severe right-angle crashes that can occur as

vehicles attempt to cross four lanes of fast-moving traffic.

As work continues over the summer, MoDOT reminds motorists to slow down, pay attention, and proceed through this and all work zones with care. The project is scheduled for completion in late 2012.

Sidewalk Project Starts in Camdenton

In just a few months, you can put on your walking shoes and stroll across the U.S. 54 bridge over Route 5 in Camdenton.

Contractor crews began work in mid-March on over 2,000 feet of new sidewalk that will be built parallel to eastbound U.S. 54 leading up to and across the bridge over Route 5.

“This work includes new sidewalk along U.S. 54 and widening the existing eastbound bridge structure to accommodate a sidewalk,” said Bob Lynch, area engineer. “This is a project that improves safety for pedestrians, but also provides access to residential and commercial areas.”

The \$500,000 project also includes widening the northbound Route 5 exit ramp to eastbound U.S. 54 to allow for dual right turn lanes. This will decrease minor traffic back-ups on the exit ramp and provide tractor-trailer trucks with more room to make right turns at the top of the ramp.

The work is being completed in coordination with the City of Camdenton. Enhancement funds, which are set aside for the improvement of pedestrian facilities, are being used for the sidewalk construction.

Construction will be complete by the end of May.

Busy Schedule Set for Bridge Projects in Osage and Miller Counties

Several highway construction projects involving road closures will get underway this year in Osage and Miller Counties and the district is working to schedule the closures to minimize the impact to travelers.

The first project is a Safe & Sound Bridge improvement on Route 133, over Sugar Creek in Meta. The bridge closed for replacement on March 5. The route is scheduled to remain closed for about 45 days.

“The community expressed concern about the timing of this bridge closure and a second closure on Route 133 to realign the roadway south of Meta,” said District Design Engineer Nicole Hood. “With additional road work taking place in Miller County, we have to keep a close eye on the construction schedules because they can affect detour routes for motorists.”

Based on the community’s comments, the Sugar Creek bridge replacement was moved from late April and the

Route 133 realignment work has been pushed back to September. Route 133 will be closed to traffic for the realignment for about two and a half months.

Three bridges in Miller County will be replaced this season, including Route 52 over Humphrey’s Creek, Route 17 over Dog Creek, and Route 17 over Saline Creek. All three projects will require the bridges to close for construction, with the following schedule:

- **Route 52, Humphrey’s Creek**
Closes early April, for 45 days
- **Route 17, Dog Creek**
Closes mid-May, for 53 days
- **Route 17, Saline Creek**
Closes early June, for about three months

“We’ve listened to the concerns of the communities to keep the Route 17 work from occurring at the same time as the Route 133 work,” said Hood.

“We made adjustments to the construction schedules and appreciate the support and input of the communities.”

Missouri Hosts National Work Zone Awareness Kickoff

As the construction season rolls into full swing this month, MoDOT will be taking the national spotlight as the lead state to kick off the 2012 National Work Zone Awareness Week activities. The department was selected to host the kick-off event on its Route 141 reconstruction project in St. Louis.

The event is scheduled for April 23, 2012 at 10 a.m. on the Route 141 project in Chesterfield.

At this time, Federal Highway Administrator Victor Mendez is expected to attend the event, as are the leaders of several national organizations concerned about ensuring safe work zones across the nation.

The department will also host the National Work Zone traveling memorial for National Work Zone Awareness Week. The memorial will be set up for the kickoff event, then moved to a public St. Louis location for the remainder of the week. During the kickoff event, the department will

also share several other displays to remind employees and drivers about the importance of work zone awareness.

During this week, drivers are also reminded that they have a responsibility to slow down in work zones, pay attention while they are on the roadways and eliminate driving distractions such as cell phone use, texting, or eating.

“As we head into the construction season, we understand that every day is a day to be aware of the work zones we set up and work in,” said Ed Hassinger, St. Louis MoDOT district engineer.

“We are continually monitoring the flow of traffic through all our work zones to make sure that traffic keeps flowing smoothly, or making adjustments to the work zone if it isn’t. The department has incorporated several

techniques to help keep traffic flowing through the Route 141 work zones during the two years of construction.

“We wanted to select a state that’s doing something wonderful that could be shared with the rest of the nation,” says James Baron, director of communications for the American Traffic Safety Services Association. “The national committee selected Missouri because we were really impressed with what the state is doing with work zone awareness.”


“This type of project is a perfect example of how transportation affects us all in some way or another,” said Don Hillis, MoDOT’s Assistant Chief Engineer. “Whether we’re talking about work zone safety, traffic flow, reducing congestion or economic impacts – transportation is personal to each of us.

“This combination of a major construction project, extensive cooperation

between state and local governments, environmental stewardship and construction innovation make this a perfect location for a national event about work zone safety,” Hillis says. “This also gives Missouri the opportunity to highlight a first-class construction project, and show

the importance of keeping workers and drivers safe in a high-volume work-zone environment.”

Every April since 2000, the Federal Highway Administration, American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials and the American Traffic Safety Services Association have partnered together to host a national event to recognize and focus on roadway work zone safety. MoDOT, elected officials and community leaders in Jefferson County broke ground March 2 for the McNutt Road Widening project. The event marks the start of construction to widen McNutt Road between I-55 and Routes 61/67.

MoDOT's St. Louis district recently held a groundbreaking ceremony in early March for the Interstate 55 and McNutt Road Widening project in Jefferson County. This event marks the beginning of construction to widen McNutt Road between Interstate 55 and Routes 61/67.

MoDOT, local elected officials, community leaders and Jefferson County residents and businesses participated in the ceremony.

This area needs to be widened to accommodate the capacity of traffic that use this roadway on a daily basis. MoDOT will widen McNutt Road to four thru lanes with additional turn lanes. Also, the Scenic Drive intersection will

be relocated approximately 300 feet to the east of the existing intersection.

Safety in Work Zones Starts with Planning

A heavy construction and maintenance workload this year has prompted Southwest District leaders to emphasize more than ever attention to detail in setting work zones.

“No matter what type of work zone, we have to do our best to protect the workers and the public,” District Engineer Becky Baltz said.

Construction employees must look at ongoing work zones with fresh eyes each day, Baltz said. Maintenance employees need “a plan for their work zones before they leave the building.” And any employee, she said, should call in if they see a problem with a utility or commercial contractor work zone.

To prepare for this year’s effort, District Safety and Health Manager Gary McLarry and Senior Safety Officer Gary Clinton have been reminding em-

ployees to observe the basics of safety on the road.

“Good work zones. Good flagging procedures. Good placement of signs. Good traffic flow. Proper placement of vehicles in a work zone,” McLarry said.

Refresher flagger training was provided last fall. Truck-mounted attenuator operations are targeted this spring.

Drivers statewide will have more say about work zones, thanks to new “Rate Our Work Zone” signs being placed at selected projects. The signs encourage drivers to fill out an online work zone survey on MoDOT’s web site after they get home or to work.

In the Southwest District, rating signs will be installed at three projects: bridge rehabilitation and road resurfacing on Route 65 between Ozark and Branson, building alternating passing lanes on Route 37 between Monett and the Missouri-Arkansas state line and building a new interchange at Main and Zora streets in Joplin.

District Construction and Materials Engineer Steve Campbell said drivers often look at a work zone differently than those who set them up and work in them every day, and incorporating good ideas from the public into a work zone can enhance safety.

“It gives us the opportunity to improve what we’re doing,” Campbell said.

Southwest District employees are helping with the statewide Work Zone Awareness campaign scheduled for April 23-27. Republic Maintenance Crew Leader Ron Plaster and Monett Maintenance Supervisor Bryan Ozburn were interviewed for safety videos being produced by the Central Office.

Ozburn said in his interview that an important part of his building’s work-plan meeting every morning is a reminder to workers to look out for one another.

“One thing that I share with the crew all the time is that we’re in this together, and it takes every one of us to be able to do a job safely,” Ozburn said.

He also wants crew members to mentally trade places with drivers “to be in the driver’s seat ... to understand what it’s like to come through the work zone.”

Look Before You Book

There's more to consider than price and convenience when buying a ticket or hiring a bus company for your group's travel. A new SaferBus free app from the USDOT lets you check bus companies' safety records before you book a trip.



The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration developed the app to give consumers easy access to 24 months of safety performance data for companies they might hire. The app provides the carriers' performance information based on unsafe driving, fatigued driving, driver fitness, controlled substance/alcohol and vehicle maintenance violations. The higher the percentage in any category, the higher the potential safety risk.

Another indicator, FMCSA safety ratings are also accessible through the app. The top rating is Satisfactory. Bus companies with a Conditional rating may pose a higher safety risk, and companies with an Unsatisfactory rating should NOT be operating.
